Reflection: Sunday 5th October 2025 Sixteenth Sunday after Trinity

The world's a funny place! – or perhaps not so funny. In politics, community life, international conflicts, climate change etc., there is much to concern and upset us. But it so happens that the disciples in today's Gospel had feelings similar to ours and so did the people listening to Habakuk in 600BC. And we read that Timothy, in the letter Paul wrote to him, was worried enough to be very tearful.

Jesus' disciples in Luke 17 were certainly having a rough time. They were concerned about safeguarding for children and they were also having to learn to forgive others who were not only hard to forgive, but were also hostile towards them. What they do is beg Jesus to give them more faith. Strangely enough, Jesus says something ridiculous. 'If you had as much faith as a seed, you could tell a mulberry tree to pick itself up and be planted in the sea'! In other words, you are deluded if you think you just need a bit more faith. To cope with the problems confronting you, you just need to continue to trust in God and be faithful servants in all you do. Hoping for some spectacular spiritual experience will not achieve anything.

Some Churches on this Sunday might keep a Dedication Festival – a recognition not just of a precious building entrusted to our care but also of our calling to serve the community around us. Like the disciples, we are called not to be spectacular but faithful.

Some Churches might also be celebrating a Harvest Festival. In times when we witness the problems caused by a changing climate, we can be fatalist and fearful. There is ample cause for that. But Jesus' words to his disciples would encourage us like them to be thankful for the wonderful gifts that we enjoy and be even more committed to sharing those gifts with those in need,

while committed to conserving the natural world. In a world of problems where there are no easy solutions, our need is to seek first the Kingdom of God, and all that we need will added to us.

Habakkuk 1.1-4

- 1 The oracle that the prophet Habakkuk saw.
- 2 O Lord, how long shall I cry for help,
and you will not listen? Or cry to you 'Violence!'
and you will not save?
- 3 Why do you make me see wrongdoing
and look at trouble? Destruction and violence are
before me;
strife and contention arise.
- 4 So the law becomes slack
and justice never prevails. The wicked surround the
righteous-
therefore judgement comes forth perverted.

2 Timothy 1.1-14

- 1 Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for
the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus,
- 2 To Timothy, my beloved child: Grace, mercy, and
peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.
- 3 I am grateful to God-whom I worship with a clear
conscience, as my ancestors did-when I remember you
constantly in my prayers night and day.
- 4 Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be
filled with joy.
- 5 I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived
first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice
and now, I am sure, lives in you.
- 6 For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God
that is within you through the laying on of my hands;
- 7 for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but
rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.
- 8 Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our
Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering
for the gospel, relying on the power of God,
- 9 who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not
according to our works but according to his own purpose
and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus
before the ages began,
- 10 but it has now been revealed through the appearing
of our Saviour Christ Jesus, who abolished death and
brought life and immortality to light through the gospel.
- 11 For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an
apostle and a teacher,
- 12 and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not
ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my
trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day
what I have entrusted to him.

13 Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have
heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ
Jesus.

14 Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the
help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

- 5 The apostles said to the Lord, 'Increase our faith!'
- 6 The Lord replied, 'If you had faith the size of a mustard
seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted
and planted in the sea", and it would obey you.

come in from ploughing or tending sheep in the field,
"Come here at once and take your place at the table"?
- 8 Would you not rather say to him, "Prepare supper for
me, put on your apron and serve me while I eat and
drink; later you may eat and drink"?
- 9 Do you thank the slave for doing what was
commanded?
- 10 So you also, when you have done all that you were
ordered to do, say, "We are worthless slaves; we have
done only what we ought to have done!"'

Harvest Thanksgiving 2025

To be used for all Harvest Thanksgiving Services

Bible Readings:

Deuteronomy 26.1-11

1 When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it,
2 you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name.
3 You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, 'Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us.'
4 When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God,
5 you shall make this response before the Lord your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous.
6 When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labour on us,
7 we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression.
8 The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders;
9 and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey.
10 So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord, have given me.' You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God.
11 Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house.

Philippians 4.4-9

4 Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice.
5 Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near.

6 Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God.

7 And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. 8 Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.

9 Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you.

Revelation 14.14-18

14 Then I looked, and there was a white cloud, and seated on the cloud was one like the Son of Man, with a golden crown on his head, and a sharp sickle in his hand!
15 Another angel came out of the temple, calling with a loud voice to the one who sat on the cloud, 'Use your sickle and reap, for the hour to reap has come, because the harvest of the earth is fully ripe.'
16 So the one who sat on the cloud swung his sickle over the earth, and the earth was reaped.
17 Then another angel came out of the temple in heaven, and he too had a sharp sickle.
18 Then another angel came out from the altar, the angel who has authority over fire, and he called with a loud voice to him who had the sharp sickle, 'Use your sharp sickle and gather the clusters of the vine of the earth, for its grapes are ripe.'

John 6.25-35

25 When they found him on the other side of the lake, they said to him, 'Rabbi, when did you come here?'
26 Jesus answered them, 'Very truly, I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves.
27 Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For it is on him that God the Father has set his seal.'
28 Then they said to him, 'What must we do to perform the works of God?'
29 Jesus answered them, 'This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent.'
30 So they said to him, 'What sign are you going to give us then, so that we may see it and believe you? What work are you performing?
31 Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, "He gave them bread from heaven to eat."
32 Then Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, it was not Moses who gave you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven.
33 For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world.'
34 They said to him, 'Sir, give us this bread always.'

35 Jesus said to them, 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.

You can drop off donations at **Hallaton Church** or to Linda Jones at **25, Eastgate, Hallaton at any time**. Please note that all food collected is non-perishable, long-life or tinned.

The Foodbank has **MOST URGENT NEED of:**

Marmalade, Jam, Tinned potatoes, Corned beef, Coffee (small jars), Dried potatoes (Smash), Biscuits, Crisps, Tinned tomatoes, Tinned chickpeas, mixed chilli beans, lentils, Custard, Tinned rice pudding, Sachet meals (pan or microwave), 'No Cook' meals for the homeless, Cordial.

They also need:

Fray Bentos pies, UHT milk (whole or semi-skimmed), Pasta sauce, Tinned ham, Crackers, Tinned soup, Cup of soup, Sugar (500g), Tinned sausages with beans, Tinned peas, Tinned ham, Tinned fruit, Tinned vegetarian meals, such as veggie chilli, Meals that do not need cooking e.g. John West Fish and rice meals, Snacks and cereal bars, Fruit squash/juice, Hot dogs (tins or jars), Tinned red meat: mince, stew, Bolognese, chilli, Microwave puddings, Pasta sauce, Peanut butter, Chicken in sauce, Tinned carrots, Tinned pasta, Tinned sweetcorn, Sandwich paste, Teabags, Tuna, ALPRO yoghurts (long-life, for the shelf not fridge), Long-life meals, Robinsons minis or similar for families (small squash concentrates), Small cartons of long life milk (for homeless people or someone without a fridge)

NEW: Report on the Diocese's Culture around Safeguarding

Earlier this year, to better understand our culture around safeguarding as a diocese, the Bishops' Leadership Team commissioned an independent facilitator, Margaret Gildea, to run a series of focus groups and online survey with clergy, lay ministers and parish safeguarding co-ordinators.

In total, about 150 people from across the Diocese of Leicester took part, answering questions about the approachability of the bishops and senior leaders in the diocese on safeguarding, the ease of challenging them, whether they felt heard and confident action would be taken when a concern was raised, and how safeguarding across the diocese could be improved.

The recommendations which emerged from the report will be translated into an action plan and taken forward by the Bishops' Leadership Team and the Diocesan Safeguarding Team.
